The March meeting will be held on *Saturday, March 8, 2008* at 1:00 PM at the Ag. Ed. Shop at the Harrisburg High School in Harrisburg.

The March meeting will provide demonstrations of basic spindle and faceplate turning techniques for new and existing members. We will also regularly include sharpening tips (so bring those tools that give you trouble and we'll help with sharpening if possible).

Directions to the March meeting

Harrisburg High School 600 S. Cliff Ave. Harrisburg, SD

From Sioux Falls: South on Cliff Avenue to Harrisburg. At the 4-Way stop there will be a Casey's on the right and a BP on the left. Continue south for approximately 2 blocks. Harrisburg High School will be on the left.

From the West: Take the Harrisburg exit off I-29. Go east about 5 miles. At the 4-Way stop by the Casey's turn right. Go about 2 blocks south. Harrisburg High School will be on the right.

From the East: On Highway 11 turn west on the Harrisburg road. Continue west through Harrisburg to the 4-Way stop with the BP store on your left. Go south about 2 blocks. Harrisburg High School will be on the left.

The Ag Shop is located around the back of the building in the northeast corner of the building.

At the January meeting...

Siouxland Woodturners January 2008 Meeting Minutes

The January 2008 meeting of the Siouxland Woodturners was held in the shop at the Harrisburg High School on the 10th. Approximately 18 members were in attendance.

Minutes of the November meeting were approved on a motion by Sue Smith and seconded by John Olson. Frank Denton was unable to attend, but had provided our account balance which is currently \$855. That report was approved on a motion by Jim Sample, seconded by John Olson.

Old Business:

Dan Humburg had purchased 10 gallons of Anchorseal. Ron Erickson moved that the Anchorseal be sold to members at \$14 per gallon, \$7 per half gallon. Corky Miles seconded that motion and it carried. All 10 gallons were eventually dispensed at this meeting. Additional Anchorseal can be purchased at a similar price.

Dan Humburg had also received confirmation that denatured ethanol can be purchased from Corn Plus in Winnebago, MN at the market price, which is currently about \$1.90 per gallon. If a local source can be identified it will be purchased here. Otherwise it may be possible to obtain some bulk alcohol from Corn Plus. A show of hands indicated that approximately 10 people in attendance would have some interest in ethanol. Assuming each might utilize 5 gallons we will seek at least 50 gallons of denatured ethanol to distribute at a future meeting.

Royce reported on the AAW grant and circulated the draft proposal. Jim Sample moved its approval and submission. The motion was 2nded by John Olson and passed.

The Stan Houston demos are scheduled for the 22nd of February and the 23rd. The Friday session could go from 8 AM to 6 PM and the Saturday show runs 8 AM to 4 PM. Jim is planning to spend much of Friday there. Anyone else interested in demonstrating is welcome to take a turn. Royce showed a banner provided by AAW to which he is planning to add Siouxland Woodturners. The banner will be displayed as we demonstrate.

New Business:

Sue Smith mentioned the ND Mini Symposium held in Bismark in April.

A discussion of library status and how to purchase videos took place. Motion made by Corky Miles to authorize \$250 for library acquisitions. The motion, seconded by Dan Humburg, passed.

The topic of planning future meeting topics was addressed. Following the discussion the following schedule calendar for 2008 was planned.

- March 8. Basic turning techniques (for new recruits that might come following the Stan Houston event).
- May 3rd. Photographic techniques for turned projects
- July 14th. Picnic and turning at Jim's home or shop
- September 6th. Turning Christmas ornaments or miniatures at the Humburg shop in Brookings
- November 1st finishing techniques John Olson

Annual dues were reviewed. John Olson moved we renew them at \$25 per year. This motion, 2nded by Corky Miles, passed.

A number of resources exist for interested turners. The AAW website was highly recommended. Sue Smith reviewed the benefits and options of the Anderson Ranch vacations. Also, the Renaissance Festival is June 6 and 7 and has space available.

At 2:30 we adjourned to the shop. Dan Humburg did a demonstration of turning a shallow bowl or plate in basswood. Jim sample also shared techniques on his mini. Thanks to both Jim and Royce for providing lathes. The meeting adjourned about 4:30.

My attention now is on segmented turning. My latest work has 17 rings (205 pieces and still on the lathe) utilizing four species: Tiger Strip Maple, Eucalyptus (Brazil), Walnut, and Sapele (Africa) using a spiral construction technique. I learn more from each project and have started a library I will share with members.
