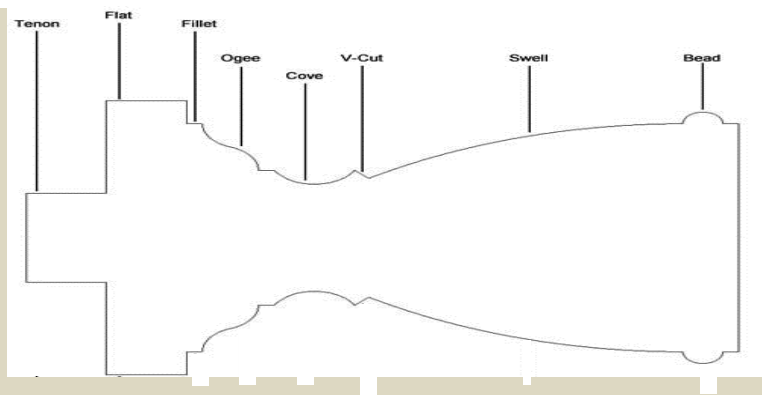
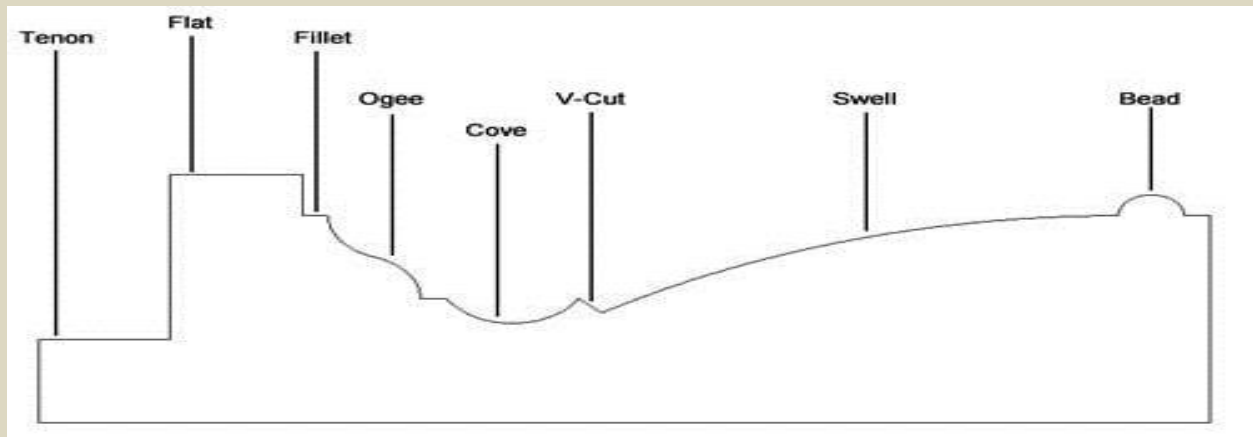

Basic Spindle Cuts

4 Basic Types of Cuts

- Flat
- Cove
- Bead
- V-Cut

The 4 cuts used in combination



Basic Spindle Turning Tools

- Roughing Gouge
- Spindle Gouge
- Parting Tool
- Skew

General Guidelines

- Sharp tools ALWAYS work better.
- Use the proper tool for the profile you are cutting.
- In most cases you will have better luck cutting downhill.
- Sharp tools ALWAYS work better.
- Strive for smooth cuts. Excessive sanding can ruin fine details.
- Speed is your friend.
- Sharp tools ALWAYS work better.

In all seriousness, woodturning will become MUCH more enjoyable if you are able to sharpen your tools effectively. If you don't presently have the necessary equipment for sharpening, GET IT! If you have sharpening equipment but don't feel confident in your ability to use it, PRACTICE! You will get better results using a properly sharpened \$10 spindle gouge than you will with a dull \$100 gouge.

At the March Meeting...

Siouxland Woodturners March 1, 2014 Meeting Minutes

Meeting called to order at 1:05 by President Doug Noteboom. Introductions of the 21 members and guests were made, with everyone telling the group about their recent turning projects.

A. **Minutes of last meeting:** Motion made and passed to accept February minutes as presented.

B. **Treasurer's report:** No report.

C. **Library report:** Please remember to check items back in when you have finished using them. AAW has three new publications that will be ordered for our library: Christmas projects; Bowls; Jigs & Tools.

D. **Community Ed report:** Doug reported that the Woodturning 101 class had 8 people and the Sharpening class was also filled with 10 people. More classes are scheduled for March and April.

E. **Membership report:** information sheet was passed around so members could verify that their data was correct. Royce said if you need a wooden name badge, sign the sheet being passed or notify him.

F. **10 Year Anniversary and Symposium:** Scheduled for June 21,22,23 of 2014 at the Family Life Center, 3100 Ralph Rogers Way (I229 and Louise exit to 57th St). Alan Lacer will be the featured demonstrator (www.woodturninglearn.net). Alan sells Sheffield English Steel tools and his prices are quite good. Sign-up began for the Sunday and Monday one-on-one sessions with Alan. If there is enough interest, Alan might be able to arrange for a third day of one-on-one sessions (Tuesday).

G. **Old Business:**

1. Stan Houston – club would like to have a 3rd lathe available for demos (if space permits). Suggestion: we should be more definite about what will be turned at what time so proper announcements can be made on the hour for those attending Stan Houston's event. Doug showed two large bowls that had been turned from blanks donated by Stan Houston. They want one back, when finished, to put on display. They will donate the other to us for a raffle at our Symposium – if you want to finish it, let Doug know (if no one wishes to, Doug will finish it).

2. Freedom Pens – Commander of American Legion related that 39 local members are being deployed.

3. Spaulding cultures – Doug had ordered 2 pink and 2 blue cultures. John Olson divided one of each color into 30 cultured jars for club members. The cultures are spread on a blank and placed in a covered tub that has water in the bottom. The cultures will not cross growth lines.

4. Doug and Royce clarified the club's insurance policy that we have through AAW. A club member is covered under the policy if he/she is acting on behalf of the Siouxland Woodturners, as a volunteer, at an event. However, if the event occurs at someone's home, then the homeowner's insurance would cover the situation.

H. **New Business:**

1. The Sioux Falls Art Festival is the first weekend in September (same weekend as our meeting). Doug asked if the club would like to have a presence at this event (he had done the festival two years ago and was pleased with the interest in woodturning). Discussion ensued and it was decided the club would not participate, but encouraged Doug to do so on his own.

2. WoodCraft is having a 15% off sale from Feb 28 to Mar 1 – Doug is ordering Petacryl wood stabilizer (for green wood – wipe on or soak to prevent cracking). One gallon = \$60; five gallon size = \$40/gal. Doug wanted to know if anyone wished to add to his order.

3. AAW membership dues are going up by two dollars on April 1, 2014.

4. AAW 2014 Symposium -- in Phoenix, June 13-15, \$275 (flight to Phoenix is additional \$275 approx.). Doug plans on going; let him know if you'd like to go/maybe share some costs.

5. Ag teacher in Montrose would like advice in purchasing lathe/etc. for her classes. After some discussion, it was decided to encourage her to attend a few club meetings and/or Adult Ed classes at CTE to familiarize herself with woodturning before taking the next step in her own school system. Royce also suggested she contact the Ag educator at Harrisburg High for info/help.

6. The subject of member photos was discussed. This would be for club use only. Motion made/passed to take photos of members that would be for the use of only club members.

7. We anticipate the donation of two Sears lathes to the club, which may be available for check-out by members (as we do with tools).

Members showed some of their creations that they brought to the meeting. Meeting adjourned at 2:15.

A demonstration on basic spindle turning was done by Royce. This served as a practice of camera technique for Gene (in anticipation of what he wants to do at the Symposium), as well as providing good information for everyone.
