Education Committee report

Classes will begin in April and will be Tuesday/Thursday for 8 weeks. Royce is looking for someone to take his mentorship for the 101 class on April 13. The question was "does the AAW mandate this membership"? Royce and Doug agreed to do further research into the requirements of the AAW.

John Weaver moved and Bill seconded that the executive committee conduct the business meeting and thus shorten the time required for the meeting. Much discussion ensued. The motion failed by voice vote.
